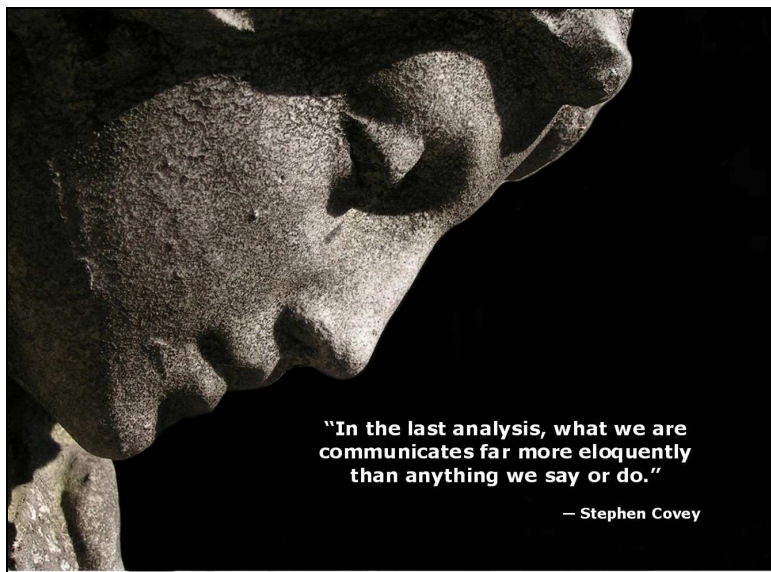

If I could have lunch with anyone, living or deceased, I would choose Albert Einstein. I have always been fascinated with him, because he was that remarkable mix of mind and spirit, logic and imagination, science and God.

A true genius? Yes. In another, I would find an intelligence that was astounding. Totally enthralled by it all, but not aware, at this point, of what was actually happening—I began taking mental notes on the individual qualities that I was discovering, and that I liked, in men. And, although I was delighted to be constantly crossing paths with greatness, I'll admit that I said (more than once!) that if I could just combine them all into one man, I would be the happiest woman on the planet! Then, laughing it off as the “impossible-possibility”; I simply began to enjoy whatever qualities were before me—whether I found them in a business associate, a friend, or an acquaintance—I would deliberately zero in on “the good stuff” and didn't give much thought as to whether it was a “piece” or a “whole” until one day, years down the road...

While I was listening to a David Lanz recording called “Beloved” (you never know when enlightenment is going to strike!), I closed my eyes and pictured myself dancing to this beautiful piece of music; and, lo and behold, all of the men who have played a major role in my life, as well as some that I did not recognize, began appearing in the dance—each with a gift; each showing me their own unique and remarkable qualities, and then fading into the music as another appeared...

When the music was over I opened my eyes, reached for a pen, and at the top of a piece of paper I wrote *The Beloved*. Then, I made a list of all the gifts I had been given, or “qualities” I had been shown, by the individuals who had been part of the dance I had just envisioned; which, not surprisingly, was also a list of the characteristics that I most admire in men.

Thinking that this list was, in some way, the complete picture of the rather elusive Mr. Whole, I sat back to review what I had written... and, suddenly realizing what I had just done, I began laughing out loud. I found it quite amazing to realize that throughout my life, I have been surrounded by Mr. Einstein—and that what often looked like “pieces” were actually “wholes” and that every whole fit together as if it were a piece. And, even more astonishing, was the realization that what I most admire in other people is that which I already am. So, in essence, The Beloved is not someone outside of me; rather, The Beloved *is* me. And, if The Beloved is me, then The Beloved is also *you*... Yes, the often unnoticed Beloved is within each of us—It sees through our eyes, It breathes through our souls; and when we finally recognize ourselves as that which It is, we draw more of The Beloved into every aspect of our lives.

So many of us are looking, looking, looking for that which we already are, for that which we already have, for that which we already know... and because we attract that which we focus upon—by focusing on what I admire most in men, without even realizing it, I have drawn a million Einsteins—a million Beloveds—into my life experience... He is all of my friends, he is all of my business associates, he is all of my sons, all of my teachers, all of my clients, all of my newsletter readers—which means that he is *you* and, because he is you, there is no doubt in my mind that you are made of impeccable character, you think extraordinary thoughts, you are passionate about life, and you have a profound sense of who you really are...

I cannot attract anything or anyone that I am not in alignment with, and by giving my attention only to what I like, what I honor, what I admire, I can only attract the people and circumstances that are made of the qualities I cherish.

You would not be reading this article if your perception were limited.
